2. Write a letter to Harper Lee expressing how you feel about the book, using text evidence to support your claims. (DOK 3)
3. Your letter should be written in proper letter format. While you may have a constructive criticism of the book, you should focus on the positive aspects. Consider what you would say to her if you wanted her to visit LUHS and share her experiences with us.
4. Create a journal with at least 3 entries from different days from Calpurnia's point of view. Entries should show how you think Calpurnia sees life. (DOK 2) OR Write a sympathy note to the Robinson family showing empathy with their perspective. (DOK 2) The final product should be three or more pages written in beautiful cursive or typed, and it should show your knowledge of specific events from the perspective of a character in the book.

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
